Phlebotomy Curriculum

At Northeast Medical Institute, we inspire, educate and train those with a desire to succeed in the world of phlebotomy. The goal is to accomplish this by providing hands-on training and attention to each student with a one-on-one focus. To demonstrate proper techniques and perform venipuncture and capillary punctures. Have knowledge and proper identification of infection control and safety techniques. Identify and understand requisitions, specimen transport and specimen processing. Go over established policies and procedures to assure quality specimens and safety, amongst other non blood procedures. Any students who successfully complete any of Northeast Medical Institute Programs will be awarded with a Certificate of Achievement in the program of study.

Program Details:

Hours: 80 Hour Program (56 Hours Online Zoom - 24 Hours Clinical Lab)

Course Length:

- Daytime: 7 Days online (Zoom) + 3 Days of Clinical Lab
 - (May not be offered at all locations)
- Evening: 16 Evenings online (Zoom) + 4 Evenings of Clinical Lab
 - (May not be offered at all locations)

Prerequisites for the Program:

- At least 18 years or older (ID Required)
- A Non- Refundable Registration fee and arrangements for tuition payments.
- Signed enrollment agreement.
- Documentation requirements:
 - Negative PPD test. (If the PPD results are positive, a chest x-ray must be done to prove true negative results).
 - Hep B Vaccination
 - All applicants must be able to speak, read, and understand English (All classes and class materials are ONLY provided in English)
- NHA Exam testing requirements. (National Healthcareer Association)

- -High School Diploma or GED (NHA requirements contact school admin for more information)
- -Completion of Full CPT Course (80 Hours, plus 30 venipunctures & 10 capillary sticks)

Graduation Requirements:

Student course balance paid in full.

Students must have successfully completed a total of 56 hours of zoom class, 30 venipuncture sticks plus 10 dermal capillary sticks.

- 10 Capillary sticks
- 5 Hand Draws (Winged / Butterfly)
- 25 Venipunctures

Upon full course payment and completion of Phlebotomy training at Northeast Medical Institute, students may sit for accreditation testing through NHA. (National Healthcareer Association)
